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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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


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
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
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PRINCIPAL'S ADDRESS


Inspired by the lesson Dukh ka Adhikar, a classroom discussion on compassion and injustice turned into a powerful idea.




VASANT PANCHAMI SPECIAL ASSEMBLY

The Annual Day Celebration 2026 was a vibrant four-day cultural fest that brought together creativity, expression, and thoughtful storytelling.


With the themes “Pragya Pravah” and “Kritagnyatanjali,” the event beautifully reflected the values of wisdom, awareness, and gratitude.



INTRODUCING MATTERS THAT MATTER

For the questions that we dont ask loud enough and the stories unheard.

Matters That Matter is an initiative from the editorial's side to provide a platform to discuss issues we often scroll past, look away from, or label as "too small" to talk about — even though they quietly shape the world we live in every single day.

We recognise that as an editorial team we have a responsibility not only to entertain, but also to inform, question, and acknowledge the realities beyond our immediate circles.

The purpose of this section is not to preach, provoke, or polarise — but to encourage awareness, empathy, and critical thinking. Each edition will feature a carefully researched article, perspective, or interview that brings attention to an issue that is often unnoticed, misunderstood, or overlooked, and asks us to think a little deeper about our role within it.

As students, we are frequently told to focus on marks, careers, and achievements. While these things matter, they are not the only things that define an education. Education is also about values. It is about curiosity. It is about learning how to question what we see, and deciding what we stand for when something feels wrong.

This section is an invitation to pause in a fast-moving world. To read. To reflect. To feel. And perhaps, to care a little more than we did before.

Not every article will need to have easy answers. Not every problem will be solved overnight. But every conversation started will be a collective step forward. Every voice raised in concern creates a ripple, a ripple capable of greater changes.

Matters That Matter begins with a simple belief: that a school publication can be both creative and socially conscious — and that our words, when used with intention, have the power to turn awareness into empathy, empathy into action, and action into change.

MATTERS THAT MATTER

STRAY ANIMALS ARE NOT THE REAL PROBLEM.

Somewhere in Telangana, animals who spent their lives roaming familiar streets, sleeping near tea stalls, waiting for scraps, and trusting humans, never woke up.

These are not scenes from a film.

They are real.

They are happening now.

In the last few weeks, reports from multiple districts in Telangana have revealed that over 1,000 stray dogs were allegedly poisoned or killed within about a month. In several villages, police have registered cases after animal welfare groups discovered **mass deaths** and buried carcasses. In a separate and equally disturbing incident in Kamareddy district, around 15 monkeys were reported dead and nearly 80 injured after suspected poisoning near a roadside eatery.

These numbers are not just statistics.

They represent **living beings**.

Dogs who wagged their tails when someone passed.

Monkeys who lived in troops, protecting their young.

Animals who did nothing more than exist in spaces humans now claim as theirs alone.

And they were **killed mercilessly** for it.

What Is Allegedly Happening

According to media reports and police investigations, some **local bodies and individuals are accused of organising or permitting the killing of stray dogs**, often using **poisoned food or lethal injections**. FIRs have been registered in multiple cases, and some **elected village representatives have been named**.

Animal welfare organisations have stated that these killings are not isolated events, but part of a pattern driven by fear, frustration, and political pressure to show “quick results” in controlling stray populations.

Quick solutions. Permanent suffering.



Stray animals did not choose this life.

They did not choose to be born on the streets, depend on leftovers, or search through garbage to survive.

They are here because **humans abandon pets, because sterilisation programs are inadequate, and because systems meant to manage animal populations aren't even considered seriously and hence fail repeatedly.**

Yet when these failures become visible, the **punishment is given to the animals.**

Not the system.

Not the authorities.

Not the people who created the problem.

The animals.

Why This Hurts More Than We Admit

India is a country that speaks often about **values, culture, and compassion**. Yet, when animals become inconvenient, we treat their **lives as disposable**.

To punish them for a system humans failed to build is deeply unjust.

Once a society becomes comfortable with killing the voiceless, it becomes easier to ignore other forms of suffering too. **Cruelty does not stay contained.**

The Myth of “Population Control”

Experts and veterinarians have repeatedly said:

Killing does not control population.

The only proven, long-term, and humane method is:

- Animal Birth Control (ABC) – sterilisation
- Anti-rabies vaccination
- Community participation



When animals are sterilised and vaccinated, populations stabilise naturally over time.

When animals are killed, empty territories are soon occupied by new animals.

The cycle continues.

Violence looks effective.

Science actually is.

These solutions are slower. They require planning. They require effort. Cruelty is easier.

But easy does not mean right.

India has laws that recognise animals as living beings who deserve protection. What the Law Says:

- The **Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960** makes it illegal to cause unnecessary pain or suffering to animals.
- Street dogs are protected under law and cannot be killed simply for being strays.
- The Supreme Court of India has upheld that animals have a right to live with dignity and that humane population control methods must be followed.

Mass poisoning or illegal killing is a criminal offence.

So when mass killings happen, they are not just heartbreaking.

They are unlawful.

More than laws, this is about who we are.

A society that measures progress only by convenience slowly forgets compassion and when compassion disappears, everyone loses.

'INSTANT & PAINFUL DEATH'

- Animal activists & veterinarians say magnesium sulphate is easily available in retail stores
- It is administered through injections by professionals hired to kill dogs
- Other chemicals such as strychnine hydrochloride is mixed with meat & fed to dogs to kill them



It's a very old practice to use magnesium sulphate to kill dogs. It is a cheap chemical that is diluted, turned into a liquid, and injected intracardially
— Senior veterinary doctor

What We Can Do

We may be students, but we are not powerless.

- We can **talk** about these stories.
- We can **refuse to look away**.
- We can **support shelters and sterilisation drives**.
- We can **choose empathy** in daily life.



Most importantly:

Do not look away.

Stray animals cannot speak but we can speak for them.

And because silence tells the world that this is acceptable.

And it is not.



My career journey began on the shop floor, quite literally, as a Production and Quality Engineer managing a manufacturing unit that produced apparel for leading global brands such as Armani, Gucci, and Sears. After completing my engineering in textiles and pursuing post-graduation from a fashion school (NIFT), I had a clear plan in mind—to start at the ground level. I wanted to deeply understand the product, the people, and the supply chain that drives the fashion and apparel industry.

This early exposure proved invaluable. It helped me understand complex problems, appreciate the importance of detailed planning, and always have a backup plan when things didn't go as expected. Working close to the action taught me how small decisions on the shop floor can influence outcomes at scale.

As I moved to my next organization, I took on the responsibility of managing an Indian fashion brand, where I led the creation of merchandise that was not only trendy but also aligned with the needs and aspirations of the target audience. This transition was a conscious and well-planned move, made after gaining solid experience in manufacturing and supply chain. It allowed me to apply my learnings and build a strong foundation in retail, helping me grow both professionally and strategically.

One of the most defining moments of this phase was building our own retail network to fuel the brand's growth. We took on an ambitious assignment—to open 100 new stores in 100 days. It turned out to be a watershed moment in the brand's journey and taught me a lifelong lesson: nothing is impossible when teams are aligned with a shared purpose and belief.

The real turning point in my career came in 2014, when I decided to move from offline retail (ABG) to online retail with Myntra and Flipkart. I was in my comfort zone, yet felt restless. E-commerce was still at a very nascent stage, and moving into an unknown space felt like a big gamble. I was nervous, but equally excited to understand a completely new set of retail dynamics. In hindsight, it remains the best professional decision I have made so far.

The first six months were extremely challenging. I tried to copy-paste my understanding of offline retail into online retail—and failed miserably. What made the difference was Myntra's culture, which encouraged experimentation, failing fast, and learning faster. As things gradually fell into place, I went on to enjoy the next decade of growth, evolving from an individual contributor to leading diverse teams of over 50 people and managing nearly USD 300 million worth of business.

Today, I lead cross-functional teams managing Myntra's in-house brands, which are among the platform's key revenue drivers. Our motto is to democratize fashion for the people of Bharat—helping customers look good and feel confident in every walk of life.

If there's one piece of advice I would share, it is this: make mistakes, learn from them, learn fast, and don't repeat them. One mistake that helped me grow was overcommitting—saying "yes" to everything. I never asked for a bigger portfolio; it came to me because of the hunger and ownership I consistently demonstrated. So don't take life too seriously. Avoid trying to control everything—life is largely unpredictable.

For anyone thinking of entering the retail industry, my advice is simple: always put the customer first. Deliver exceptional, personalized service, master your product knowledge, and focus on creating memorable experiences that keep customers coming back.

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
